4-H Club Rules

All 4-H classes and contests are open to currently enrolled Oregon 4-H

Cloverbud – For members 5-8 years old (only show small animals)

Junior - For members 9 - 11 years old

Intermediate - For members 12 - 14 years old

Senior - For members 15 - 19 years old

(Age as of Sept 1 of previous year, 19-year-olds must still be in high school)

1. All exhibitor entries must be done through ShoWorks online. *Paper entries will not be accepted.*
2. **4-H Records Deadline.** 4-H records are required for special contests and must be submitted to the 4-H office on the Eastern Oregon Livestock Show grounds by 9:00 am Thursday. No exceptions. **Record books need not be submitted at the show unless competing for special awards or entering the Record Book Contest (Union County members only).**
3. All animals must be in place by 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday and will be weighed upon arrival. **All breeding stock must cross the scale for a health check as well.** See Rule 2 underweight requirements. (All animals other than market are released from the grounds on Friday at 6 p.m. and should be removed).
4. Exhibitors of 4-H market animals must have owned and cared for their animals at least 60 days prior to the show (except steers which are 120 days), breeding animals is 90 days. Exhibitors must verify possession through ShoWorks by species possession dates. *If an animal is leased, a lease agreement must be turned into the Union Co. Ext. Office by April 5.*
5. Market Lambs must be slick shorn (wool not to exceed 3/8”) across the scale, or animals will not be allowed to be shown or sold at show. Animals must be dry and with no blankets when crossing the scales. Hogs should have all excess mud removed.
6. Registered animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor. Registration in a partnership or family name is acceptable providing that the 4-H member’s animals have been identified to the club leader at the beginning of the project.
8. **All fitting, training, care and showing must be done by the exhibitor** (*exception: junior and novice members may receive minimal assistance from **older 4-H members only, not adults***). **Violations: show committee and 4-H Program Coordinator will give one warning; second violation: contestant will be disqualified from show and auction.** Animals and stalls must be presentable at all times. All animals must be clean when exhibited, shown, and sold.
9. Market animals or feeders may be purebred, crossbred or grade. Breeding females may be purebred or grade but must conform to breed types.
10. All market animals are to be judged by weight rather than by breed.
11. All 4-H members are allowed to weigh in and sell one market animal.
12. **An exhibitor may take only two entries in each breeding class.**

13. Fleeces exhibited must have been shorn in the current year. They should be contained in a clear garbage bag with a 4-H wool tag attached.
14. Because of space limitation in barns each sheep and goat exhibitor will be limited to **five** sheep and/or goats. This includes market animals. We also do not have swine breeding classes.
15. No animal shall be exhibited in more than one class, except classes for breeding groups, horse classifications and market pens. An animal may not be shown as a market animal and breeding animal.
16. No animal shall receive an award higher than the judge determines.
17. All exhibitors must enter and take part in a showmanship contest in one of their respective divisions, and must show their own animals. Horse club members should participate in an equitation class.
18. Novice livestock showmanship classes are for 4-H members in their first year of 4-H.
19. Class order: senior, intermediate, junior, Int/Sr novice, Jr novice
14. The judging schedule as outlined will be strictly adhered to. However, exhibitors with class conflicts should be in communication with superintendents. All efforts will be made to accommodate youth showing in multiple projects.
15. Stalls: stalls are cleaned during our clean up days but may be used by others before the show. We appreciate you cleaning your stall per your preferred biosecurity needs when you arrive. Each exhibitor must clean out the manure in their stall and place it in the designated area by release times: Breeding stock is Friday at 6:00 p.m. In compliance with Union City ordinance, it will be necessary to separate wires and paper from manure. Special containers will be provided for this purpose.
16. The Danish point system will be used. Points will be totaled for all showmanship classes.
17. Points will be awarded to first, second, and third place, according to the various classes.
18. Club members must furnish their own grain and hay. No straw allowed. Chips will be provided for all species.
19. Safety rules:
 - a. No riding of horses inside the horse and livestock areas.
 - b. No saddled horses in stalls.
 - c. Pitchforks, rakes and other items of equipment must have the tines on the ground when not in use and the handles securely fastened.
 - d. No cars, trucks, or other motor vehicles will be allowed within the livestock and horse areas between 8 am - 5 pm.
 - e. An unmanageable animal may be requested to leave the show. Exhibitors of questionable beef animals will be required to lead their animals a prescribed distance. Any control decisions will be made by the division superintendent, an EOLS officer and respective 4-H or FFA staff. Any excused animal is disqualified from the show.
 - f. Nose tongs will not be allowed.

27. Health/Ethics Policy - The 4-H Program, Eastern Oregon Livestock Show and Sale supports the humane treatment of all animals. We are committed to:
 - a. Upholding the welfare of animals as a primary consideration in all activities.
 - b. Requiring that animals be treated with kindness, respect, and compassion.
 - c. Ensuring that owners, trainers, and exhibitors use responsible care in handling, transportation and exhibiting their animals.
 - d. Providing for the continuous wellbeing of animals through proper feeding, disease prevention, sanitation, and attention to their safety.
 - e. Supporting scientific research to improve the health, safety, and wellbeing of livestock.
 - f. The state 4-H Oregon animal science exhibitor agreement covers all animal projects and must be signed by exhibitors.
28. Club members may discuss placings with official judges, but undue criticism and unsportsmanlike conduct will not be allowed.
29. Club members must allow their animals to be used in livestock and horse judging contests if needed.
30. Any adult who wishes to file a complaint may do so in writing to the EOLS Board of Directors and accompany the complaint with \$50 cash fee (non- refundable). See “Appeal Process” in auction rules.
31. Each member paying the exhibitor fee & participating at the Eastern Oregon Livestock Show will receive an exhibitor rodeo pass. Exhibitor passes may not be used by volunteers. A special adult pass will be given to 4-H leaders and other volunteers who assist at the show.
32. A Change of Ownership brand inspection slip (E-slip) must accompany all market steers at weigh in.
33. A “COOL” form and market health form is required for all market animals and will be collected at weigh in.
34. Animals exhibiting in “Other Breeds” class: If five (5) or more animals of an unlisted breed are shown, a separate class will be established with champion ribbons awarded. “Other Breeds” class will be judged independently based on their respective breed merits. Champion ribbons will be awarded if merited.
35. Sale & Show Policies for club animal or donation animal:
 - a. Must have approval of 4-H Program Coordinator in charge of show
 - b. A club will only be allowed to sell one animal.
 - c. A club will not sell an animal in two consecutive years.
 - d. A club animal will be shown in appropriate conformation class by a club member to determine grade and place.
 - e. Must own animal at least 120 days for beef and 60 days for lambs, hogs & goats.
 - f. Animal must be entered by deadline in showmanship & conformation.
 - g. Donated through club or club member.
 - h. Identify what proceeds are going toward.

- i. Special sale instructions should be emailed to Elaine La Rochelle before the sale order is made.
 - j. Clubs must have submitted an Intent to Conduct a Fundraiser Form & received approval PRIOR to entry deadline
 - k. Proceeds from the animal must be split 50/50 between the club and the 4-H EOLS Building Improvement Fund.
36. If an animal crosses the scale at EOLS and weighs in, it will be tagged and will be considered in-eligible for future shows.

4-H and FFA Auction Rules

EXHIBITORS

1. All 4-H and FFA members currently enrolled in an Oregon 4-H or Agriculture livestock project are eligible to enter the EOLS Junior Auction classes.
2. Potential exhibitors must pre-register for the EOLS by published entry deadline.
3. Exhibitors are allowed to sell **one** market animal.
4. Exhibitors are required to show in at least one showmanship class. This animal may be a market or breeding animal which is entered in the show.
5. Any animal shown in either a 4-H or FFA market class and deemed eligible for sale at the Eastern Oregon Livestock Show Auction, MAY NOT be shown in any future market classes in any show. EOLS is a **Terminal Show**. *Any animal purchased through the sale is NOT eligible to be shown in any market classes again or any breeding classes until the following year.*
6. All market animals must meet the guidelines within the 4-H and FFA Premium Books as well as the rules stated within these auction rules to be eligible to sell.
7. All Exhibitors are required to complete & submit at weigh in:
 - a. COOL Form - USDA Country of Origin Affidavit *prior* to or at weigh-in, verifying the animal was bred and born in the USA.
 - b. Market Health Record - form stating dates and names of all vaccinations animal has received. (available on the Union County 4-H Extension Website <https://extension.oregonstate.edu/4h/union/eastern-oregon-livestock-show>).
 - c. E-slips (for ALL market steers, including homegrown) – Brand Inspection certificate showing change of ownership.
(*Note: Exhibitors should also have received a COOL form completed by the original breeder verifying the animal origin - this should be kept in the exhibitor's record book.*)
8. Only animals exhibited in the regular market classes at this show may be sold through the Auction. Each exhibitor must personally show their market animal in the appropriate market class.
9. Exhibitors must personally sell their own animal in the auction ring
10. All members showing market animals in the EOLS Junior Auction are strongly encouraged to promote the Auction and the purchase of animals. While promoting, members should invite potential buyers to the auction avoid specifically asking buyers to purchase their individual animal. Members can write an invitation letter that includes a picture share a brief personal story.

REGISTRATION AND CHECK IN

1. Market animals must be weighed between **2:00 p.m.** and 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday of the show. Animals should weigh upon arrival at the stock show grounds.

2. In case of extenuating circumstances, owners of any animals that need to arrive before **2:00 p.m. MUST have written permission** from the Union FFA Advisor for FFA animals or the Union County 4-H Program Coordinator for 4-H animals acknowledging the reason for early arrival. **All early arrivals will be stalled but must have a health check and be weighed as soon as scales open at 2:00 pm.**
3. If there is an emergency regarding late arrival for market animal weigh in, individuals must call the EOLS 4-H Office at 541-562-6237 to obtain approval for late arrival.

WEIGHT REQUIREMENTS

1. **Official Sale Weight** - The official sale weight shall be weight upon arrival less a 2% shrink. *Only one weight will be permitted.* Any re-weigh requested must happen immediately. Animals will exit the scale; scale will be zeroed, and animal will be reweighed.
2. Exhibitors may bring two animals (same species) to weigh in. The first animal to make weight across the scales will be considered the animal entered in the EOLS market class. Second animal must leave the grounds unless can be entered in a breeding class. All animals must be clean and dry before crossing the scale. Hogs must have excess mud removed .
3. Weigh in conditions are identical between 4-H and FFA. 4-H animals will weigh on the 4-H scale; FFA animals will be weighed on the FFA scales. That weight will stand. Prior to the show, scales are checked and certified by State Weight and Measures Division.
4. **Weight Requirements** – Market animals will be weighed on the official scales and must meet the minimum/maximum weight requirements for their species to be allowed to sell in the auction. If a re-weigh is requested the animal will step off the scale, the scale will be rebalanced, the animal will immediately re-weigh and that weight will stand.
5. Market animals not making the minimum weight or going over the maximum weight will NOT be eligible to sell through the auction but are allowed to be shown in a feeder or over-weight class and showmanship class to allow exhibitors to still compete at the show. Exhibitors of under/overweight animals may add their animal to a potential buyer list in the 4-H office in case there are after auction buyers available. No sale flyers are allowed to be posted. The auction is not responsible for the sale of these animals or for their care.

SALE ORDER

1. **Individual animal order** – Sale order of individual animals is determined by conformation and champion drive placings. Class placing determined by the judge will be based upon quality (grade) and market class placing. Within each species the first to sell will be the highest placing animal with the highest-grade classification (indicated by blue or red ribbons). Animals receiving a white ribbon for grade will not be allowed to sell. Within each grade classification, sale order will alternate between 4-H and FFA participants as appropriate.
2. **Overall Show Champion of Species** – An overall species champion of both 4-H and FFA shows will be the first animal to sell in the specie sale order, followed by the Champion and Reserve Champion of the Divisions (per rotation as defined in the program order below).
3. **Sale order of species** – Sale order will be determined by auction committee and published in the official sale catalog.
4. **Program order** – 4-H and FFA will alternate every year as to which program member will be the first to start the auction. FFA will go first on odd years and 4-H will go first on even years.
5. **Sale Order** – The official sale order is posted one day prior to the EOLS Auction by the Auction Committee. It is the responsibility of the member to be aware of their place in the order and be in line and ready for their rotation into the auction. Any members missing their rotation will not be allowed to sell in the auction at a later time.

SALE REQUIREMENTS

1. All animals meeting the weight limitations will be evaluated by a qualified judge who will estimate if beef grades select, choice, or prime; if sheep will grade choice or prime; if hogs will grade US 1 or 2 or if goats will grade choice or prime. **The Judges decisions are final.**
2. All market lambs and goats grading choice or better must be sold through the Auction. Steers grading prime, choice or select must sell in the Auction. Market hogs grading 1 or 2 must sell in the Auction. Lambs and goats grading below choice; standard steers and utility hogs will receive a white ribbon and will not be allowed to sell through the auction.
3. Transfer of ownership takes place at the time of the sale. Once auction animals leave the grounds all responsibility for animal transfers to the buyer.
 - All Exhibitors will care for their market animals through 6:00 p.m. Saturday night. If your animal is a “Pickup or Take-Home Animal”, please water your animal once that species has completed selling. **All pick-up/take home animals must be checked out with the Auction Office before loading.** The Auction Committee will assist in loading out of the animals. All animals should be off the grounds before 7:00 pm of sale day.

4. Resale Animals Condemned at Commercial Slaughter - If an animal is rejected, condemned, or discounted in the commercial slaughter process for any reason, the final buyer could have the option of accepting the floor price of the animal. *The exhibitor could assume this loss at the discretion of the auction committee.*
5. There will be no decorating of sale animals.
6. **Market Steer Requirements** - Change of Ownership Slips (E-slips not transportation certificates) must accompany all market steers and must be presented to the weigh master at weigh in time. Steers will not be allowed across the scales without the appropriate transfer slip in hand, there will be no exceptions. *(These forms should be completed at time of purchase and signed by original seller.)* Market steers must be dehorned and healed. A maximum of 2-inch scurs are allowed. Measured at the base of the scur.
All resale steers (both 4-H and FFA) will be sold on carcass and yield grade. Any discount taken or premium paid by the re-sale packers will be passed on to the exhibitors. This means that the exhibitor will be paid on carcass quality plus the premium the buyer bids above market price. Market steers going for re-sale may be charged a feed lot fee for approximately one week if arrangements are made in hopes to prevent “dark cutters.” Exhibitors that sell steers to buyers of locker meat will be paid total price bid on animals using the live grade. All market steers sold as custom kill at the auction must be left tied with a rope halter at least 3/8-inch in diameter in the areas designated for the Custom Kill Processors. All Exhibitors will care for their market animals through 6:00 p.m. Saturday night. All re-sale steers will be turned loose in the location stated by the Auction Committee.
7. **Market Goat Requirements** – It is recommended that market goats be dehorned but not required if horns are the breed standard. If animals show any sign of being unsafe because of their horns, exhibitors may be asked to cap or tip horns or remove the animal from the grounds.

ANIMAL HEALTH POLICY

1. The Eastern Oregon Livestock Show Junior Auction is committed to the production of safe, wholesome food products and the safety of all exhibitors and visitors.
2. The EOLS Animal Health Inspection Committee reserves the right to require a health inspection, diagnostic tests, treatment and/or disease control measures or procedures, which become necessary in emergencies at the exhibitor’s expense.
3. All male market animals must be castrated and completely healed with no visible signs of scrotum. No **cryptorchid** will be allowed to show/sell in market classes. All animals will be checked as they cross the scale. Animals that make it across the scale may still be disqualified by the judge.
4. An unmanageable animal may be disqualified from the show and auction at any time it is deemed necessary.

5. Disqualification of an animal is not directed towards an Exhibitor. It is for the safety of all exhibitors and visitors as well as to produce safe, wholesome food products.
6. ALL ANIMALS shall be subject to inspection by the initial EOLS Animal Health Inspection Committee upon admission to the grounds or by members of the Animal Health Committee as deemed necessary throughout the show. No animal shall be admitted to the show or allowed to remain on the grounds that shows evidence of abuse, infection, contagious disease, any unsightly disease or condition, (i.e.: warts, ringworm/club lamb fungus, pink eye, strangles, contagious ecthyma (sore mouth), scabies, lice, mites, ticks, fleas, hernias, prolapse, etc) or is unmanageable.
 - The Animal Health Committee will be made up of one representative from 4-H, FFA and the Auction Committee.
7. It will be the initial EOLS Animal Health Inspection Committee's decision to isolate the animal for disqualification from the show if there is any question about the health of the animal. Animals NOT passing health inspection by the Animal Health Committee must be IMMEDIATELY removed from the grounds.
8. Due to recent trade agreement restrictions between the United States and China the domestic packers who purchase the market swine at the Eastern Oregon Livestock Show Junior Auction WILL NOT accept any hogs who have been fed the feed additive Ractopamine.
9. Any market swine who are fed Ractopamine with NOT be eligible to sell in the EOLS Auction. Exhibitors will be required to sign a feed restriction affidavit upon registering for the show. If an exhibitor violates this rule and the packer rejects the carcass, the exhibitor will forfeit their check. Forms are available on the Union County 4-H Extension Website <https://extension.oregonstate.edu/4h/union/eastern-oregon-livestock-show>

APPEAL PROCESS

1. Any person who wishes to file a complaint or grievance must do so in writing, using the EOLS "Appeal Form", to the EOLS Appeals Committee immediately. The decision of the committee shall be final. A nonrefundable \$50 cash fee must accompany the written complaint or grievance. Exhibitors who submit a written complaint will have their animals placed in a separate pen until the EOLS Executive Board reviews the complaint with the Appeals Committee.
2. If the complaint or grievance is deemed worthy of further consideration by the committee, any additional expenses (veterinary, legal or other) to be incurred in the resolution of the complaint must be paid in advance by the person filing the complaint or grievance.
3. If the complaint or grievance is upheld by the committee and additional costs were incurred, then the owner of the animal in question bears the burden of additional costs and the committee refunds the additional costs (not including the non-refundable \$50 fee) to the person submitting the complaint.

4. In the case of the committee upholding the complaint, the animal will be immediately removed from the grounds and the owner will lose the privilege of exhibiting at EOLS. To be reinstated to the show in the future, the exhibitor of the animal in question must appeal to the EOLS Board in writing, no later than the March meeting of the following year.

PAYMENT

1. **Sales Commission** - All Exhibitors will be charged a four (4%) commission. Commission is used to assist with auction expenses and support repairs and maintenance of facilities.
2. All Exhibitors selling market animals will be paid within 90 days of the close of the Auction. Steers will be paid as stated in the rules above; hogs and lambs will be paid based on Sale Weight.
3. For those 4-H and FFA members that have financed their market animals through a lending institution, market animal checks will be jointly issued when EOLS Auction Committee has been so advised.
4. Market checks may be reissued if lost. The current cost of the stop payment fee will be deducted from the new check.

COMMITTEES

1. **Initial EOLS Animal Health Inspection Committee** - The initial EOLS Animal Health Committee shall include two (2) to three (3) unassociated market animal producer(s) (i.e. a lamb, hog or beef producer without immediate family showing in that species) and a Program Director (4-H or FFA) and will be available only on Wednesday, weigh-in day. If the initial Animal Health Committee is not immediately available, the animal in question will be placed in a separate pen by the Superintendent until the Committee is available.
2. **EOLS Animal Health Inspection Committee** - The balance of the Committee shall consist of the EOLS Auction Chairman, Auction Barn Superintendent, EOLS Executive Board and one Program Director from both 4-H and FFA and a Licensed Veterinarian. The Veterinarian will be available only on an on-call basis. The Producer(s) and the Licensed Veterinarian shall be procured by the EOLS Auction Committee prior to the show. The EOLS Animal Health Inspection Committee may be called together for other issues after weigh-in day as needed.
3. **EOLS Appeals Committee** - The Appeals committee will consist of four people: the appropriate 4-H or FFA staff member, two EOLS Auction Committee members and one EOLS Executive Board member.

Herdsmanship

Beef (including Dairy Cattle), Sheep, Swine, Goats and Horse 4-H HERDSMANSHIP Contest is the way members demonstrate their knowledge of safety procedures and display their animals to the public and other 4-H members. HERDSMANSHIP is designed to provide experience in developing courtesy, cooperation, neatness and the proper care of animals. Parents are encouraged to give guidance; however, members **MUST** do their **OWN** work. Stall decorations are optional. Herdsmanship will be judged periodically each day of the show. The Herdsmanship judge will post daily placings on stalls.

Basis for Scoring

CLUB MEMBERS (1-40 points). (Members to be observed when present, continued attendance not required).

- Cooperation (between members, leaders, and other clubs) Courtesy, friendliness, positive attitude

Livestock will be divided by Beef (including dairy cattle), Sheep, Swine, and Goats, with each species receiving an award.

Horse will be divided into two groups. They will be judged as follows: 1) Individuals and small clubs up to 6 members, 2) clubs with 7 or more members.

Each group with the highest points will receive an award. In case of a tie, it will be left to the judge's discretion.

Horse

Animal(s) must be in possession and care of the member by **April 5**. *An animal obtained after this date is subject to review by the Show Committee (4-H Program Coordinator, Chairman and Co-chairman) as to eligibility.* If a 4-H member's horse is unable to be shown, the member may show a different horse with approval of the 4-H Show Committee. The member may receive a ribbon in the entered classes but is **not eligible** for **Champion or Reserve Champion**. Please go to your Show Committee to discuss any special circumstances.

Effective January 1, 1996, all Oregon 4-H members participating in any equestrian activity, regardless of riding seat, will wear a properly fitted equestrian helmet which meets the standards imposed by the American Society of Testing Materials (ASTM) F1163 and includes certification and labeling required by the Safety Equipment Institute (SEI). Such headgear will be secured with the harness engaged and properly fastened when mounted on an equine or in a vehicle (cart, wagon, buggy, etc.) being pulled by one or more equine.

All members must ride with boots, bridles (no halters) and saddles as per 4-H Horse Contest Guide. No riding doubles. No wet mares or stallions may be shown in 4-H classes. No riding of horses inside the horse and livestock exhibit area. Only horses being shown by 4-H exhibitors may be stalled on the grounds. Any exceptions **must** be approved by 4-H Program Coordinator.
